Memories of Japan

Seasonal Foods of Japan

Ever since my dad had brought Japanese food home from his coworkers, I have always been intrigued at the variety of foods that come out of Japanese culture. This is the reason why I have chosen seasonal foods across Japan as my research topic. However, I will be specifically focusing on summer foods of Japan.

Shabu-shabu, yakitori, somen, and kakigori are some of the specialties served in restaurants across Japan. The foods are not all savory. Some have tangy twists, or sweet notes to them. In Japan, I will be comparing the summer foods of America to the summer foods in Japan. It is interesting to me that not all Japanese summer foods include meat in their entrees. It is very different from the entrees filled with meat in America.

There are all specific times to eat dishes. Some should be eaten at dinner time, while others should be eaten for breakfast or lunch. One dish that is supposed to be eaten as a dessert after lunch is kakigori. Eating kakigori will leave your taste buds with a tingling sweetness while keeping you refreshed. Somen noodles are paired with a fantastic dipping sauce. Somen noodles are served hot in the wintertime, but mixed with ice cubes in the summer to balance out the hot weather. There are many other dishes with dual purposes.

These other types of food could be eaten for lunch or dinner, that are often specialties in the summertime. There is somen, which consists of translucent wheat noodles topped with tamago (egg), cucumber, and meat. My first host family added some delicious spam. After all the toppings a dark amber colored sauce is poured onto the noodles to give it a sweet and tangy flavor to it.

One of my a most memorable food experiences was visiting the Tsukiji fish market in Tokyo. The market will be relocated to another city by 2020. When I walked into Tsukiji fish market I had no clue where the entrance was. Most of the food that was being sold there was seasonal; however, it really blew my taste buds. I had never eaten these foods before. One of the most interesting foods was unagi, or eel. The eel had a hint of a fishy smell and a flaky texture to it. In many of the stalls they sold cold soba and cold udon. Both of these dishes were noodle dishes, however, they each had a very unique dipping sauce to compliment the noodles. The udon had a fishy soy sauce based sauce while the soba dipping sauce was more clear in its taste. Both dishes were paired up with delicious tempura. The foods that were listed in this report were very healthy and it really showed me the true Japanese 'home' cuisine. 署

Compared to all the other months at school, June may almost seem dull. It's the only month without any threeday weekends, national holidays, or special events. But, it comes as a welcome reprieve - a month of refreshing normalcy sandwiched between two very fast-paced months.

At the start of May during this year's Golden Week, Japan celebrated the abdication of its former Emperor, signaling the end of the Heisei Era and the beginning of the *Reiwa Era*. It's a rare occasion – an emperor stepping down - which calls for a joyous 10day long vacation! An absolute rarity in this country.

During that time, two of my best friends visited from California. I was able to introduce them to both Shibatasan and Nakano-san from KIRA!
