Focus on Fifty

The First Bunka-Sai Mikko Haggott Henson

First President of TSCA

The first Bunka Sai was held in June 1973, soon after the sister city affiliation was signed. The purpose was to raise funds for the Torrance mayor and chairman of the sister city committee to visit Kashiwa in October 1973. The event was planned by the Torrance Area Chamber of Commerce because the sister city relationship was under the jurisdiction of the Chamber of Commerce at that time. The present, autonomous, non-profit membership organization, Torrance Sister City Association (TSCA) was founded in 1976. Before then, it was one of the subcommittee activities of the Torrance Area Chamber of Commerce.

In the early 1970s, the City of Gardena had success fundraising with a Japanese festival. Kenny Uyeda, a longtime Torrance city planning commissioner and Japanese Gardeners Association member, was involved in this festival. This fundraiser was Kenny's idea and he brought all the exhibitors and participants from the Gardena Japanese festival to Torrance. To differentiate it from all other Japanese festivals, we decided to call it Bunka-Sai. Bunka means culture in Japanese. Gardena's Japanese festival was discontinued in 1980.

The first Bunka-Sai was a one day event at Ken Miller Recreation Hall and admission was charged. It was mostly exhibition only: bonsai, ikebana, Japanese dolls, Japanese brush painting, Japanese calligraphy, koi fish etc., with a few demonstrations. The main feature was a Japanese garden. Gardena Valley Gardener's Association built a Japanese garden on the patio area overnight and disassembled it the day after the festival. It was very impressive. This Japanese garden display continued for 17 years at our Bunka-Sai.

Funds raised from this first Bunka-Sai paid for the airfare of Mayor Ken Miller, who refused to use city money for this trip, and for Brian Bell, chairman of the sister city committee at the Chamber of Commerce. The other five participants of this delegation were Joe Banando, the Torrance Lions Club President, Ben and Mikko Haggott,

and Mr. and Mrs. La Fleur, whose daughter Mary designed the TSCA logo, paid their own way.

In November of the same year, Kashiwa sent a tenmember official delegation to Torrance which included seven assembly members and three city staff. The money raised from Bunka-Sai was also used for these expenses. It is clear that 1973, the first year of affiliation, was a very busy year for Torrance. #

Teach English

in Kashiwa, Japan

The Torrance Sister City Association seeks qualified applicants for one high school English teacher in Kashiwa, Japan, the Sister City of Torrance. A minimum one-year contract runs from August 1, 2022, to July 31, 2023. The contract is renewable for a maximum three-year assignment.

Duties: Conduct and assist in a variety of English conversation classes; assist with coordinating campus visits by parents, administrators, and junior high students; and assist with extracurricular activities, which may include judging and assisting with speech contests, serving as adviser to the English Conversation Club and business trips, and coach students for college interviews. Volunteer work with KIRA (Kashiwa International Relations Association) and other city groups may also be required.

Qualifications

Applicants must:

- Live or work in Torrance
- Be fluent in written and spoken English
- Hold a Bachelor's degree plus a teaching credential or have demonstrated teaching experience
- Possess a keen interest in the Japanese language and culture
- Represent the Torrance Sister City Association and foster the goals and objectives of the English Teacher Exchange Program.

Compensation

- Annual salary of approximately 4,800,000 Japanese yen
- One-way airfare from Los Angeles to Japan
- National health insurance (deducted from monthly salary)
- Subsidized housing and transportation allowance
- Paid Japanese holidays and personal days

KIRA Alumni News Rina (Yamada) Neman

What have you been doing since you went to **Torrance?**

I went to Torrance as an exchange student in 2016. My experiences really motivated me to study English harder and to also leverage my newly developed English skills to deepen my understanding within my major. I studied Education at Chiba University in Japan.

To further my English studies, I decided to study in Finland for ten months to study Education and Gender. I lived in a student dorm while I was in Finland. I primarily studied in English so I only learned a few Finnish words. After I graduated from Chiba University, I worked as a home economics teacher at a middle school and high school from 2019 to 2021. The first school was a competitive private school called Ichikawagakuen and the second school was a public school called Ichikawa Third Junior High School.

After working as a home economics teacher, I worked as a human resources contractor while I was preparing to move to the states. I have been in the states since December 14, 2021, and I'm currently taking an English course at the University of Texas, Austin while preparing for my next job. Since Texas is close to South America, I've also had the chance to become friends with some girls from Brazil, Venezuela and Colombia. I'm looking for a job in the human resources industry.

How has your experience helped you adjust to your new life in America?

My experience in Torrance and interaction with the TSCA students and my host families definitely helped me to understand American culture better. Also, the good memories of how we enjoyed and respected each other's culture enabled me to learn and interact with other cultural differences positively as well.

Another example of my time in Torrance helping me adjust to my life in America is that I initially found out in Torrance that American stores usually sell bulk packages of food, and I've learned how I can budget effectively, and make use of buying food in bulk, such as freezing chicken and beef.

Moreover, even for the little things such as greetings, it's nice to have already gotten used to hugging when I meet my friends or how to respond to short conversations in

stores, such as: "How are you doing?" "Good, how are you?" and "Have a nice day (Have a good one)!" "You too," and so on.

My time in Torrance was amazing and will always be a wonderful memory of mine!

I met Trevor when he was studying at my university in Chiba. We haven't had our wedding yet due to COVID, but are planning to do it in Hawaii sometime soon. I feel Austin is quite a modern city, especially downtown. Austin is a multicultural city and you can get Asian food including Japanese food very easily! There is a kind of similar atmosphere as central Tokyo in downtown Austin as well. Austin doesn't have beaches like Torrance unfortunately, but we can enjoy hiking alongside rivers and many parks with creeks. \(\mathbb{H} \)
