

# English Teacher Report

## 完全な円: A Teacher's Journey and Nature's Serenade

My journey with Ichikashi began in 2018 through the North and Ichikashi exchange program. During the first part of our trip, I explored the bustling streets of major cities and savored the serenity of rural landscapes with some of my best friends. It was a crash course in the diversity and richness of Japanese culture, offering a well-rounded glimpse into the country.

The second week, we reunited with the students who had ventured to California in November 2017. Among them was my friend Eisuke and his family, whose warmth and hospitality became a defining aspect of my time there. We traversed that week together, immersing ourselves in shared experiences, and in a mere seven days, bonds had forged that felt as though they'd weathered years. Leaving Japan was nothing short of heart-wrenching, knowing that our time together had barely scratched the surface of the camaraderie we shared. That separation fueled a determination within me to return to this land.

Every good story has a conflict and my plot twist arrived in the form of visa delays, a hurdle that stretched my patience and resolve for nearly three months. Instead of the anticipated late August arrival, I landed in mid-November. With little time to dwell on the delay, I plunged headfirst into the rhythm of this new reality. The urgency of the situation propelled me straight to the school upon touchdown. Turbulent as the circumstances were, there was an unspoken sense of duty—a determination to seamlessly integrate into a semester already in motion.

Amidst the whirlwind of relocating across the Pacific and the emotional rigors of teaching, moments for reflection were scarce, reserved for the quiet pauses while awaiting my evening bus home after school. It was in those solitary moments, surrounded by the reddish leaves adorning the school's entrance, that the realization struck—I had never truly experienced the authenticity of an autumn before.

The urgency of my unexpected arrival left no room for hesitation; instead, it fueled a drive to act swiftly and decisively. Amidst rapid adjustments, the intricacies of teaching English unfolded and exposed the labyrinth of language. Teaching extended beyond mere words on the page, encompassing the subtleties that transcend them—intonation, tone, and the delicate dance of effective communication. It reinforced that language is not just a compilation of phrases but a symphony of expression. My purpose now extends beyond imparting language skills; it encompasses sharing experiences, nurturing curiosity, and fostering connections that transcend linguistic boundaries.

Once mid December came around, I had time to stop and think. With all the students out for winter break, I thought about how amazing it was that Chris, my senpai, managed to handle all of our classes for the majority of the semester while I was awaiting my visa. As I walk the halls filled with pictures from the last 50 years of friendship, I am reminded of all that the ALT's before me have accomplished and I am inspired by the mark they've left. Brandon's introduction of video editing sparked a surge of creativity among the students, Deanna's incorporation of movement techniques proved transformative in guiding students from thought to action, and Amie's enduring TGIF initiative continues to be a place where students can engage in language exchange in a much more relaxed setting!

As I stand amidst this confluence of past and present, I am reminded that our journey is a continuum, a tapestry interwoven with the threads of yesterday, today, and the promises of tomorrow. The Torrance Sister City Ssociety stands as a testament to our commitment—nurturing these bonds that traverse oceans, echoing the sentiment that distances are mere markers in the grand scheme of our shared humanity.

# English Teacher Report


